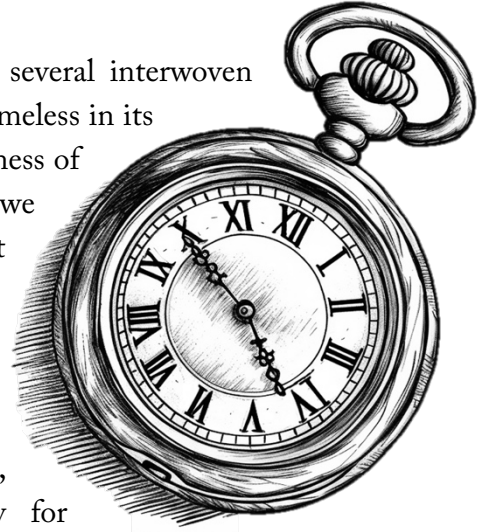
A GLIMPSE INTO HISTORY
